### LETTER **FROM THE CEO** William French, Vice Admiral, USN, Ret.

The Armed Services YMCA has ever been responsive to the changing needs of military families. The only constant in life is change, and it's our ability to adapt to change that has forged an unbroken line of service to military families stretching back generations. And we intend to continue that service for many generations to come.

In 2022, we committed to a long-term strategic plan that saw us growing and changing to meet the needs of modern military families. Last year, we exceeded all expectations by growing program participation by an unprecedented 47%. Such growth—*and the ability to support it*—is a testament to the wisdom of investing in our people, our systems, and in our commitment to our strategic plan.

But... this growth is also evidence of the pressure that local, national, and global forces place on the finances and security of hard-working military families. The need grows. The need for supplementing the grocery budget; the need for affordable, high-quality child care; the need for social connection and community—and as we saw in 2023, a recurring need to rapidly respond during crises. Our numbers served have not grown by chance or choice—they have grown by meeting the needs that rise as inevitably as the tide.

As we continue our investment in growth, we will continue meeting military families where they are, helping them to strengthen their resources and resiliency, and to decrease the challenges of military life that can be a barrier to continued service.



### LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN Dave Halverson, Lieutenant General, USA, Ret.

In 2023, the Armed Services YMCA experienced unprecedented growth as the demand for and delivery of our programs and services increased by an astonishing 69% across the breadth of the organization. Socioeconomic and geopolitical forces fueled an accelerated op-tempo and left military families struggling to overcome inflation and anxious about their future. As always, the ASYMCA stepped up to provide stability and security and to ensure that no military family is left behind.

Financial instability, inadequate access to child care, military spouse unemployment, and food insecurity threaten force readiness, retention, and recruitment. They erode family resilience—and in fact—our national security. The ASYMCA remains steadfast and unwavering in our obligation to mitigate the challenges faced by our nation's heroes, and together we can do so.

As the scale and the scope of our organization grows, we require solutions for measuring and communicating our impact to our stakeholders, including our Board of Directors, leadership team, staff, funders, donors, sponsors—and of course—the military community. In keeping with our strategic plan, we made great strides in standardizing and streamlining operations at both the national and branch levels by investing in the tools, people, and resources necessary to do so. As Peter Drucker says "Efficiency is doing things right, effectiveness is doing the right things." At the ASYMCA, we are committed to doing both.

We know that our ability to make informed decisions and remain agile in our response to the needs of military families is essential to ensuring we deliver on our mission. The U.S. Armed Forces are the tip of the spear in defense of democracy and in the fight against terror. Because of our loyal partners and friends, who have invested in us, we continue to invest in their strength and resiliency. For your ongoing support we are eternally grateful.

# FOOD SECURITY

Inflation exacerbated financial instability for military families already grappling with military spouse unemployment, and continued putting stress on service members' households, causing many to struggle to put food on the table. Food pantries now exist near every major military installation, and in 2023, all ASYMCA branches provided assistance to help vulnerable families facing food insecurity.

The ASYMCA served over 102,000 military families, providing over 3.25 million pounds of food.



# CHILD CARE

Accessible, affordable, and high-quality child care remains a common struggle for military families. While affordable child care is a national issue, it is even more vital for service members, who move often, work irregular hours, or live far from extended family and friends. ASYMCA child care programs provide a trusted foundation on which military families can rebuild their stability, regardless of how far from home they are.

The ASYMCA served 32,000 children, providing more than 600,000 child care services to military families.

### YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The military child experience is unlike any other, and the ASYMCA childhood education and resiliency programs remain in high-demand year over year. From the littlest learners to the fearless resident campers, military children enhanced bonds with parents, developed character, and learned invaluable resiliency skills through the ASYMCA Youth Programs.

The ASYMCA's Youth Programs served over 18,000 children and parents and provided over 159,000 points of service.



# **EDUCATION SUPPORT**

Most military children will move nine times before they graduate high school, causing many to experience learning loss, isolation, and low self-esteem. These children also play a critical role in their families, caring for an injured parent or helping watch younger siblings. Operation Hero helped military kids adjust to these unique struggles and excel in school, while never feeling alone.

The ASYMCA served 1,700 children, providing 26,000 points of service to military children struggling to cope at school or home.
